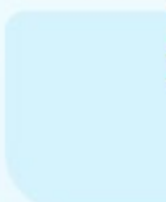

- An Introduction

Named after Swami Vivekanand, a great visionary, spiritual leader, the college was established with the notification of the state Govt. on July 1, 1994 for running arts faculty only. The majestic and well designed building of the college was built by the ACC. Science and Commerce faculties were started in 1998. The college is affiliated to H.P. University and was given due recognition under UGC section of 12(B) in 2008 and 2 (f) in 2009. Two new vocational courses BCA and PGDCA were started in 2009 under the self-financing scheme. In the year 2012, M.A. English was started. In the same year another vocational course B.B.A. was started under self financing scheme. Two more PG courses M.Sc. Physics and M.Sc. Mathematics were introduced in 2017, M.A. Political Science & M.Com. in 2019 and M. Sc. Chemistry, M. Sc. Botany and M. Sc. Zoology were introduced in 2020. B. Voc Courses were also

introduced in the session 2021-22. In the session 2022-23 this institution came under the "Utkrisht Mahavidyalya Yojna" under this scheme this institution got a grant of Rs. 1 Crore for institutional development under various heads. In the year 2020, NAAC team visited the college and the college is re-accredited as 'B Grade' institution. The college is spread over in a 73.11 bighas of land. The entire campus of the college is under CCTV surveillance and is connected to Wi-Fi and Broadband Internet system.

The college is dedicated to the cause of learning by imparting education to inculcate a sense of responsibility & devotional service among the students. The college provides a blend of academic, cultural, sports and intellectual resources. It also brings to the students a dynamic environment for the overall development of their personalities, aspirations and talents. Today, the college is known as one among the finest institutions in the state. The college has registered a tremendous growth in enrolment. At present about three thousand students, coming from far-flung rural areas, are studying various UG and PG courses being run by this college.

The college has well-equipped laboratories catering to the needs of the students in science faculty and also in the Geography, Music and Computer Applications. It has a girls' hostel having a capacity to accommodate 91 girl students. It has its own well-furnished gymnasium, a boxing ring, Playground, Examination hall, as well as a well equipped conference Hall. The college has a well-stocked library.

Over the years, the college has shown consistently good results and every year students of this college get positions in the merit lists notified by H.P.

RAGGING-A PUNISHABLE OFFENCE

If an individual or a group of students gives mental or Physical Torture to a new student because of which he/ she is afraid/unable to pursue his/ her studies in an academic atmosphere, it shall be treated as ragging.

Any student, found involved in ragging, will be punished appropriately and the punishment may include :

Expulsion from the College / University

Suspension from the classes

Fine with a Public Apology

Withholding Scholarships or other benefits.

Ban to represent the college in various sports / cultural events.

Suspension or expulsion from hostel or mess.

Legal proceedings under criminal law shall be initiated. Any person, who is found to contravene the provisions of subsection (I) of H.P. Education Institution (Prohibition of Ragging) ordinance, 2009 shall, on conviction, be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend up to three years or fine which may extend up to fifty thousand rupees or both.

ADMISSION**GENERAL ADMISSION RULES:**

- i) Admission to various classes will be made on the recommendation of the admission committees constituted for the purpose.
- ii) Any gap (latest) in the academic career of an applicant must be supported by a documentary evidence/ affidavit as the proof of his/her activities during the period of gap.
- iii) A candidate seeking admission to first year of any course must be accompanied by his/her parent/guardian at the time of admission.
- iv) All admissions will be provisional subject to the approval of Vice-Chancellor, H.P. University Shimla
- v) Admission will be strictly on fulfilment of eligibility conditions as fixed by HPU Shimla/H.P.Govt

Note: i) Rules for admission are subject to change as per HPU notifications/H.P.Govt. Directions.

ii) Admissions to B.A./B.Sc./ B. Com. Ist year will be as per the final directions from the Govt.

ELIGIBILITY

- i) **For Admission:**
 - a. Candidate must have passed the 10+2 Examination (Academic Stream) conducted by the H.P. Board of School/or any equivalent Board Education or an examination accepted as equivalent thereto by the various bodies of the H.P. University.
 - b. Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with arts/humanities stream shall be given preference in admission to B.A. Programme.
 - c. Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with science stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Sc Programme.
 - d. Provided that the candidates who have

passed the qualifying examination with commerce stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Com. Programme.

ii) For the Degree :

- a) The candidate shall have to undergo the prescribed courses of study for a period not less than three academic years and not more than five academic year, pass the examinations prescribed and fulfill such conditions as have been prescribed therefor.
- b) For the degree (B.A/B.Sc/B.Com.) a student will have to accumulate 132 successful credit hours of entire coursework over a minimum of three and a maximum of five years from the date of admission.
- c) Provided that not more than three attempts will be allowed to pass a course.

Duration (Time Frame)

The UG (TDC) programme is for a minimum period of three years and a maximum of five years from the date of admission of the candidate.

Under annual system, (BA/B. Sc./ B. Com. Under (CBCS), the total credits for the pass course at under-graduate level is 132 and for Honours courses at under graduate level is 148.

* For determining CCA following procedure shall be applicable:

- i) 5 marks for attendance.
- ii) 5 marks for class test Seminar Examination of 10 marks to be taken on completion of 40%/70% syllabus respectively by the class teacher.
- iii) 10 marks for tutorials/house assignment /quiz/seminar/Field report/survey /Lab CCA to be taken on completion of 75% of syllabus.

* The minimum passing marks will be 40% in aggregate. However, 35% each in Internal Assessment and Final Examinations will be compulsory. For practical 40% passing marks will be compulsory and if a candidate fails to obtain

40% marks in practical will be treated as fail in that subject (As per university norms).

* A candidate failing in either one or two subjects/papers will be given compartment in that subjects/papers and will be eligible for promotion to the next class. He/She will appear in the subject/paper in which he/she has got the compartment. He/she will have two chances (one at the supplementary stage and one at the annual stage), available to him to clear his/her compartment in subjects/papers. He/she will not be awarded the degree until he/she clears all his/her courses within five years from the date of his/her admission to a particular course. A candidate failing in three or more subjects/papers will be treated as fail in that year and has to repeat the entire year.

* The successful candidates will be classified on the combined results of the Part-I, II, III examinations as follows.

First Division : 60 marks or more in the aggregate

Second Division :
50% marks but less than 60%

Third Division : Less than 50%

* The students shall be required to complete the degree within 5 years.

UPPER AGE LIMIT FOR ADMISSION

- i) For admission in TDC- First Semester the maximum age limit is 23 year (25 year for girl candidates) as on 1st July 2025.
- ii) For SC/ST candidates relaxation of three year in age is allowed.
- iii) The Vice-Chancellor can, in exceptional circumstances and to be recorded in writing, give relaxation in age up to maximum of six months.

REFUSAL OF ADMISSION

1. Not with standing eligibility for admission, the Principal may refuse admission, if the conduct of a student has not been upto the mark during previous years.
2. A student disqualified/expelled/ rusticated by any University shall not be admitted to

any course during his/her disqualification period (HPU.Ord. No.3.6)

3. The Principal reserves the right to disallow or cancel any admission.
4. **As there is no provision of compartment in the National Open School, New Delhi rules, so a candidate failed in any one or more than one subject/subjects out of five, is not eligible and will not be admitted (as per University Ordinances/Rules)**
5. An applicant having a stay of more than five years in any college will not be admitted to any course.

MIGRATION

- a) Candidates coming from Boards/ Universities other than H.P. Board of School Education/Himachal Pradesh University **must produce original migration certificate enclosed with the HPU Enrolment Form.**
- b) Those, who have passed first year/second year of a degree course from other than H.P. University, will have to acquire Equivalence certificate of H.P. University course/Syllabus.
- c) Candidates, seeking migration from affiliated colleges of HPU, shall have to apply on the prescribed form.

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

1. Application form, available in the college office/College website must be complete in all respects along with the following documents:
 - a) Character certificate from the institution last attended or issued by Gram Panchayat Pardhan or by some H.P. gazetted class-I officer in case of an applicant seeking admission to the first year of any course or an applicant from any other College/ University seeking admission in the second or third year of any course.
 - b) Attested copy of detailed marks of the

previous examination passed. In case of non-receipt of this certificate the candidate may attach a certificate issued by the Head of the institution last attended.

- c) Attested copy of Matriculation Examination / Date of Birth Certificate.
- d) Two passport size photographs of the candidate and one passport size photograph of either father or mother.
2. A candidate seeking admission to the 1st year of any course, must appear before the concerned admission committee with his/her parent/guardian.
3. A candidate seeking admission to any class should appear before the concerned admission committee, thereafter, before the scrutiny committee and finally before the Principal.
4. After the approval of the Principal the candidate must deposit fees within the days fixed for fee deposit.. In case he/she does not deposit his/her dues, his/her admission shall stand cancelled.
5. Candidates seeking admission to the first year of any course B.A/ B.Sc /B.Com will also fill up their H.P.U. Enrolment form and will enclose copies of matric and 10+2 certificates.
6. At the time of appearing before his/her admission committee, the applicant should submit his/her application form, complete in all respects with other documents in the sequence given below.
 - i) Admission Form
 - ii) Attested copies of all required certificates (Matric, +2, previous class passed and Character Certificate)
 - iii) Undertaking by Parent/Guardian.
 - iv) Copy of Aadhaar Card.
 - v) P.T.A. Enrollment Form,
 - vi) Library Enrollment Form
 - vii) House Exam. Result Card.
 - viii) Card regarding Annual Meeting of the Parent-Teachers' Association.

The CBCS SYSTEM

1. **Definition of key words:**
 - 1) **Choice based Credit System (CBCS);** the CBCS provides choice for students to select from the prescribed courses (core, discipline specific elective, skill enhancement, ability enhancement, generic courses)
 - 2) **Course:** Usually referred to, as 'papers' is a component of a programme. The courses should define learning objectives and learning outcomes. A course may be designed to comprise lectures/tutorials/laboratory work/field work/outreach activities/project work/vocational training/viva/ seminar/term papers/ assignment/ presentations/self-study etc. or a combination of some of these.
 - 4) **Credit point:** It is the product of grade point and number of credits for a course.
 - 5) **Credit:** A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching (lecture or tutorial) or two hours of practical work/field work per week.
 - 6) **Cumulative Grade point Average (CGPA):** It is a measure of overall cumulative performance of a student over all semesters. The CGPA is the ratio of total credits of all courses in all the semesters. It is expressed up to two decimal places.
 - 7) **Grade point:** It is a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10 point scale.
 - 8) **Letter Grade :** It is an index of the performance of students in a said course. Grades are denoted by letters O, A+, A, B+, B, C, P and F.
 - 9) **Programme :** An educational programme leading to award a Degree, diploma or certificate.
 - 10) **Transcript or Grade Card or Certificate:** Based on the grades earned, a grade certificate shall be issued to all the registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will display the course details (Code, title, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of that semester and CGPA earned till that semester.
2. **Types of course:** Courses in a programme may be of three kinds: Core, Elective and foundation.

- 1) **Core Course:** There may be a Core Course in every semester/year.
- 2) **Elective Course :** Elective course is a course which can be chosen from a pool of papers. It may be :
 - Supportive to the discipline of study.
 - Providing an expanded scope
 - Enabling an exposure to some other discipline/domain
 - Nurturing student's proficiency/skill.

An elective may be "Generic Elective" focusing on those courses which add generic proficiency to the students. An elective may be "Discipline centric" or may be chosen from an unrelated discipline/it may be called an "open Elective."

Foundation course: The Foundation Courses may be of two kinds: Compulsory Foundation and Elective foundation. "Compulsory Foundation" courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement. They are mandatory for all disciplines. Elective Foundation Courses are value-based and are aimed at man-making education.

3) Letter Grades and Grade Point:

- i) Two methods-relative grading or absolute grading- are in vogue for awarding grades in a course. The relative grading is based on the distribution (usually normal distribution) of marks obtained by all the students of the course and the grades are awarded based on cut-off marks or percentile. Under the absolute grading, the marks are converted to grades based on pre-determined class intervals. To implement the following grading system, the college and universities can use one of the above methods.
- ii) The HPU Shimla recommends a 10-point grading system with the following letter grades as given below:

- iii) A student obtaining Grade F shall be considered failed and will be required to reappear in the examination.

- v) The universities can decide on the grade or percentage of marks required to pass in a course and also the CGPA required to qualify for a degree taking into consideration the recommendations of the statutory professional councils such as AICTE, MCI, BCI, NCTE etc.

Classroom Attendance - Each student will have to attend a minimum of 75% Lectures/Tutorials/Practical. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the Annual Examinations.

- ✘ Provided that those having between 74% and 65% attendance will apply for exemption in a prescribed form accompanied by clear reason (s) for absence to the authorized functionaries.
- ✘ Provided that those having between 64% and 50% attendance will apply for exemption in a prescribed form accompanied by a Medical Certificate from a Government Hospital.
- ✘ Provided that exemption from 75% attendance will be given to those participating in prescribed co-curricular activities (e.g. NCC, NSS, Youth Festivals, Sports etc.) to the extent of 25% (making the necessary attendance as 50% in these cases). However, the claim for this exemption should be supported by authenticated certificate from the concerned college authorities.
- ✘ Provided further that those getting these exemptions will not be entitled for getting the CCE marks for classroom attendance as given below.
- ✘ Those having greater than 75% attendance will be awarded CCE marks as follows

> 75% but < 80%	1 marks
80% to 85 %	2 marks
> 85 but < 90%	3 marks
90% to 95 %	4 marks
> 95 %	5 marks

FINES AND PENALTIES

1.
 - a) Failure to pay dues on due date will entail a fine of Rs. 1 per day.
 - b) In case a student does not deposit his/her dues in advance his/her name will be struck off from the roll at the end of the month.
 - c) The name of the student shall also be struck off from the roll of the college, if he/she remains absent without leave for **Continuous 10 days or more.**
 - d) *If the name of a student is struck off, he/she must be accompanied by his/her parent or guardian at the time of re-admission.*
 - e) Re-admission is permissible, with a fine of Rs. 100.00 on the **recommendation of concerned teachers, If the name of a student is struck off.**
 - f) If the name of a student is struck off for the second time, he/she will have to pay a fine **Rs.200** Students will not be admitted if his/her name is struck off for the third time.
 - g) Once name is struck off, the student must readmit himself/herself within seven days. After that he/she will have to pay **a fine of Rs.10/- per day** at the time of re-admission.
 - h) The Principal can expel a student from the college if he/she is found guilty of misconduct.
 - i) Every student will have to procure No-dues certificate from college Library/ concerned Science department/ N.S.S/ N.C.C / Sports /College Canteen etc. if he/ she wants to leave the college.
 - j) The security deposit will lapse if a student does not apply for refund of security within **one year of his/her leaving the college.**

COLLEGE LIBRARY: ITS RULES & FACILITIES

- i) The college library has more than 12500 books. The library subscribes 25 magazines, 18 Hindi / English Newspapers, Daily & Weekly, 20 printed journals and 38000 E- Journals as well as 91,000 E-books for its users.
The College has E-library having free Wi.-Fi. facility to the students, free excess to online journals, books Magazines, Video lectures and air conditioned reading rooms.
- ii) The library has a sitting capacity of 200 students in its reading section.
- iii) Two books are issued for a period of 15 days only, Fine @ Rs.1.00 per day per book will be charged from the defaulters. Books can be re-issued for a short period if it is in great demand by the users.
- iv) In case a book/books is / are lost/ damaged / torn by the user, he/she will have to replace the same of latest edition or pay actual cost with 20% extra of the same.
- v) Reference books/newspapers/journals /magazines will not be issued in any case but the same can be consulted with in library premises with the written permission of the Librarian.
- vi) The Identity cum library card is a legal document and must be preserved carefully. The same will be issued to the students form the library immediately after their admission in the college. In case it is lost, student should return the book/books borrowed in the library and submit a written request to the librarian about/for loss and getting duplicate card. An amount of Rs.20/- shall be payable for issued of duplicate "Identity cum library card."
- vii) Every user who enters the library shall sign the register in token of his/her acceptance to adhere to the rules of the library.
- viii) All belongings except purses and notebooks shall not be allowed to be carried with the readers beyond the issue counter. These shall be kept/deposited at the property counter.
- ix) A security amount of Rs. 100.00 (Refundable) is taken from the every student at the time of first admission in the college.
- x) The college library has a well stocked Book Bank from where any student can get a book issued for the whole session on nominal fee by depositing refundable security for a particular book. For details contact Librarian
- xi) The reader shall keep silence within the library premises.

LEAVE RULES FOR STUDENTS

- i) A student can proceed on leave with prior permission from the Principal but the application **should be signed by the parent/guardian of the student** and duly recommended by the tutor.
- ii) A tutor/class teacher can sanction leave upto 3 days while a leave application upto 7 days is to be sanctioned by the Chief Tutor/Vice Principal. Leave for more than 7 days is to be sanctioned by the Principal only.
- iii) **The application must be got sanctioned by the applicant himself/herself and he/she must ensure that the concerned subject teachers have noted down the leave. Application being brought for sanction not by the applicant himself/herself but by some other student will not be considered.**
- iv) Leave on account of illness, if it is for more than three day, must be accompanied by a medical certificate/ Registration Slip.

- v) Student may proceed on any kind of leave but he/she must deposit his/her fees/fines on the appropriate day. Otherwise his/ her admission will stand cancelled. Similarly, he/she is also required to return the books on the fixed day.
- vi) Students, who go for participation in various inter-college games or other competitions will have to get their leave sanctioned & noted by the concerned subject teachers before their departure for the participation.
- vii) Leave during House Examinations will be sanctioned by the Principal after the recommendation of the concerned subject teachers in special cases only.

ANNUAL PRIZE-DISTRIBUTION

Prize Distribution Function is held every year in the month of March and various prizes such as academic, sports and cultural are awarded to the students in order to encourage them. Students standing first and second in aggregate and in the subjects are felicitated subject to the fulfilment of certain conditions. Who are claiming first or second prizes in aggregate must not have less than 50% marks in aggregate and those, who are claiming prizes for standing first or second in the subjects must have at least 50% marks in the concerned subject and must have passed all the subjects. In case the number of students in a subject is less than 10, there will be only first prize. Similarly for college level competition in Sport/NSS and all other extra curricular activities excluding academics if the number to teams / students is less than 5, no prize is awarded.

RULES FOR AWARD OF PRIZES ACADEMICS

- * First and second prize to students of undergraduate classes standing I and II in the subjects respectively in the College in HPU Annual Examination
- * Students not securing 50% marks in the aggregate or in the subject concerned and fails in any subject of study shall not be considered for the prizes
- * College Roll of Honour will be awarded to a student securing a position in HPU merit list.

SPORTS / CULTURAL/NCC/NSS

- * First, second and third prize to students securing I, II and III position respectively in National/Inter-Zonal/inter Varsity/ HP University/HP State sports/ Cultural events.
- * First and second prize to students securing I and II position respectively in the college sports cultural events.
- * Prizes to NCC students for participation in RD parade, selection in National/ Directorate level camp/State RD position in shooting, best-turnout and selection as Best Cadet.
- * Prizes to NSS students for selection as Best Volunteer and Group Leader.
- * "College Colour" to students for their outstanding performance in National/State /HPU sports of cultural or NCC or NSS events.

TUTORIAL/MENTOR GROUPS

Tutorial groups are formed as soon as a new academic session begins. In the tutorial classes students discuss their academic problems face to face with their teachers, Those, who do not attend the tutorial classes are fined.

ROVERS AND RANGERS

One unit of Rovers (Male Section) and one unit of Rangers (Female Section) have been sanctioned by Bharat Scouts and Guides H.P for the college. Scouting and Guiding educate an individual through various social activities/programmes and competitions which are mainly based on community development.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

The college has two units of N.S.S. The enrolment is made by the Programme Officers All interested students have to apply to join N.S.S

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

The College has one NCC wing. This is a three year course and enrollment is done only in the Ist year by the PI staff deputed by the Unit. There are a total of 54 vacancies, out of these 33% are reserved for girls.

COLLEGE MAGAZINE

A college magazine, in its true form, mirrors a profile of the college. The college brings out the yearly issue of its magazine named "**PARIJAT**". The students may submit their articles within the specified date for inclusion in the magazine.

B. Voc

Bachelor of Vocational course was also introduced during the Academic year 2021-22. to provide career oriented education and opportunities.

SELF FINANCING COURSES

The college is also running Bachelor of Computer Applications (BCA), Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) & Postgraduate Diploma in Computer Application (PGDCA) under self-financing Scheme. A separate prospectus is available for these courses in the college. HEIS is running these courses in the college.

CAREER COUNSELING & PLACEMENT CELL

A Career Counseling & Placement Cell has been established in the college to guide and counsel students regarding their career. Advertisements for different posts/training programmes from various newspapers are displayed for students' benefits. A separate cell has been set up in the college library to guide as well as provide career-oriented information to the students.

CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

A student is defined as one who devotes his time in the pursuit of knowledge by engaging in fruitful studies. This is only possible if students help the college staff in building up a conducive and healthy environment in the college. For maintaining discipline in the college campus, the Principal can impose fine, suspension or expulsion of any student who is found indulging in such misconduct as listed below.

- a) i) **Ragging is banned in the institution and any act of ragging in the campus will be severely dealt with. Ragging implies harassment/physical or mental torture to another student by a student or a group of students. Any student found associated in such**

notorious activities will be guilty of gross misconduct and can cause his/her expulsion from the college. Further, legal proceedings under criminal law shall be initiated and any person who is proved to be indulged in the ragging shall on conviction be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years or with fine which may extend to fifty thousand rupees or with both.

- ii) Anybody found guilty of writing obscenities/dirty words on black boards, wall or furniture.
- iii) Aimlessly loitering in the corridors, raising noise there or attempting to disturb classes.
- iv) Smoking or taking drugs/alcohol/chewing paan/chewing gum/ gutka & spitting inside the college building [A fine of Rs. 100/- (minimum) will be imposed for the offence.]
- v) Use of Mobile Phones inside the college building is strictly prohibited as per H.P.Govt. Notification. (A fine of Rs.500/- (minimum) will be charged from the guilty student)
- vi) To pluck flowers or damage plants. [A fine of Rs. 50/- (minimum)]
- vii) Any attempt to damage the furniture, window panes or other property in the campus.
- viii) To fiddle with the electric installations.
- ix) To indulge in any rash/ unbecoming behaviour.
- x) To use unfair means in the examinations.
- xi) To bring outsiders to the college is strictly prohibited and attracts heavy fines, rustication and even expulsion.
- xii) To paste notice, hand bills, pamphlets on notice boards without the prior permission of the Principal. Writing slogans and pasting handbills, pamphlets or notices on the walls of the college campus (including boundary walls) is strictly prohibited and may attract heavy fine, rustication or expulsion.
- xiii) a) Students creating disturbance in corridors by shouting, exploding crackers or kicking doors of lecture rooms etc. will be fined amounting to rupees 500/-. A strict disciplinary action will be taken against the defaulters.
- b) **Every student should carry his/her identity card which is issued to the students after admission. It should be shown/produced on demand.**
- c) Students, who participate in sports or other extra-curricular activities/ educational tours must produce written permission from their parents/guardians.
- d) Parents/guardians are requested to remain in touch with the Principal and the concerned teachers regarding the progress of their wards in the college.
- e) Whenever the parents/guardians are requested to meet the Principal in connection with some problems regarding their wards, they should immediately come to the college.
- f) Single use plastic and Junk Food are prohibited in campus.

COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION

Parent- Teachers' Association : Parent-Teachers' Association has been formed in the college to assist the college authorities to undertake developmental activities and also to develop a rapport between the parents and the teachers for the smooth functioning of the college. The need of the hour is the constructive interaction between the parents and the teachers. Its objectives are :

- i) To arrange time to time discussion with the elderly persons of the society and to incorporate their suggestions for the improvement of the educational standards of the college.

- ii) To inform the parents/guardians about the performance of their wards from time to time and to make arrangements for them to meet the concerned faculty staff once in a quarter.

There will be a general body of P.T.A., of which the parents or guardians (only those who are blood relatives of student studying in the college) will be the members. The Principal of the college will be the patron of the body.

OLD STUDENTS' ASSOCIATION

Old students' Association has been constituted in the college to support the parent institution's goals and to strengthen the bond between alumni, the community and the parent institution.

NOTICE BOARD

All the students of the college must read the notice boards on regular basis to keep themselves aware of the latest developments in the college. A regular visit to the notice board will save the students from many problems. All important informations regarding day-today activities of the college are displayed regularly on the **Digital Notice Board**.

EDUCATIONAL TOURS, EXCURSIONS

The college allows various educational tours, excursions and picnics during the session. Interested students must keep the following points in their mind while joining any tour, picnic or excursion.

- Educational tours will be organised during holidays.
- Excursions will not be of more than three days.
- Any student interested to join excursion or educational tour must submit written consent of his/her parents (either father or mother) on a form to be supplied by the office, failing which he or she will not be permitted.
- No student can join a tour or excursion if any of the subject teachers does not allow on account of his/her shortage of attendance.
- Interested students must submit the complete form in all respects to the Educational Tour-cum-Excursion Committee.
- No educational tour, excursion can be organised without accompanying any teacher or without the prior permission of the college administration.

HOSTEL

The college has one girls hostel. Students seeking admission to the hostel must apply on the prescribed form available within the college prospectus. Those girl-students, who belong to SC and ST category are given preference in Hostel admission. The students of General category are given admission only if the rooms are left vacated after the admission process. The admission to the hostel will be open for ten days after the last date of admission. A student suffering from an infectious disease will not be allowed to stay in the hostel.

Rules:

- ✧ Residents are expected to conduct themselves with dignity and decorum at all times in the hostel,
- ✧ Residents are required to observe perfect silence in the reading rooms. They should not disturb other residents by making a noise.

- ❖ In case of non-payment of dues or remain absent without leave or violation of any hostel rules by a resident, Warden may get her room locked or opened for possession without any liability whatsoever.
- ❖ Residents should lock their rooms whenever they go out. The responsibility for any loss of goods, money jewellery or any other items will be that of the occupant of the room.
- ❖ Boarders are expected to keep their surroundings neat and clean and make proper use of dustbins.
- ❖ The Hostel warden appoints a hostel Prefect who looks after the discipline and daily attendance of the girls.
- ❖ No inmate is allowed to use electric appliances in the room.
- ❖ Entry of outsiders in the hostel is strictly prohibited.
- ❖ Use of drugs or intoxicants, smoking and ragging in the hostel are offences which can result in the eviction of the offender from the hostel.
- ❖ Pets are not allowed in the hostel
- ❖ No boarder is allowed to proceed to her native place without prior permission of the Hostel warden
- ❖ On leaving / vacating the hostel the boarder shall have to procure a "No Dues Certificate".
